Spending Review Impact on Carers

The Comprehensive Spending Review in October 2010, set the budgets for Government Departments until 2015. There were a number of significant announcements around the social care and benefits systems which will affect many carers.

will affect many carers.

An additional £2 billion funding for social care shows that the Government has listened to the concerns of carers, disabled people and many organisations including DPfC. Although local authorities still need to prioritise social care, to avoid cuts to care and support services, which may lead to people giving up work to care.

The biggest impact emerging from the spending review seems to be on welfare benefits. It is unclear how much the universal credit system will effect carers income.

The benefits cap of £500 on couples or £350 for single adult households could have a devastating impact on families who care. This may force carers to give up their caring responsibilities, which would ultimately cost the state more.

DPfC will have more to say on this issue as details emerge.





Millions of Carers Gained New Rights

People caring unpaid for disabled people gained new rights under the Equality Act 2010

The new rights will mean that carers cannot be directly discriminated against or harassed because they are caring for someone who is disabled.

Imelda Redmond CBE, Chief Executive of Carers UK, said, "We often hear of situations where carers have been treated less favourably by employers, overlooked for promotion, or not allowed the flexibility they are legally entitled to in work. Around 3 million people currently juggle work with care and these rights could make a big difference. The employers that we work with through Employers for Carers are already supporting carers better in the workplace and have found real business benefits as a result - saving both money and keeping valuable staff - as well as improving carers lives.

She added, "Carers UK has fought for and won many rights for carers over the years, but this is a significant step forward that many carers have been waiting for.

The new rights also protect carers where they are provided with a worse service than someone who isn't caring for a disabled person. It also includes protection where carers are discouraged or prevented from using a service because they are caring for a disabled person.

Carers Rights Day Friday 3 December

Carers Rights Day is all about Carers getting to know their rights and claiming what they are entitled to.

This year Carers UK and Doncaster Partnership for Carers (DPFC) will be focusing on the Equality Act 2010 and informing carers about what new protections for carers in the Equality Act will mean for them. Census 2011... Help Shape Tomorrow!

The next Census takes place on 27th March 2011 and the information gathered is used to plan a wide range of public services.

The Census needs to provide an accurate count of the population as councils receive funding from government based on their total population, making it vital that everyone is included. Every person missed off the Census means a loss of funding to that council area for a period of ten years.

The 2011 Census again asks a question about any carer role that individuals undertake, particularly about the number of hours per week that are involved. Anyone who is a carer in a household other than their own can help the process by checking that a Census form is completed for the person they care for.

The actual process this time will be a little

different to the last Census. Beginning in early March Census forms will be delivered by Royal Mail to every household. The form can be completed and returned in the post-paid envelope or the details can be recorded online on the special 2011 Census website. There will be online help, telephone helplines and guidance to completing the Census will also be available in many different languages.

If you would like to know more about the next census let Doncaster Partnership for Carers have the details and these can be passed to the local Census staff.

The Government to Review Carers Strategy

Before the end of the year the Government is to refresh the Carers Strategy with a view to producing a plan for 2011 to 2015.

The carers strategy sets out the government's short-term agenda and long-term vision for the future care and support of carers.

The rejuvenated carers strategy will set out the key activities which the government - working in partnership with local authorities, the NHS, the voluntary sector, local communities and carers - will focus on from April 2011 onwards. Views were sought by central government on the key priorities, supported evidence of good practice and what factors will have the

greatest impact on improving carers lives in the next four years. Doncaster council and DPfC have both responded, giving their views on the future of carers needs.

Taking into account the governments review, Doncaster carers strategy group is now reviewing Doncaster carers strategy. They are looking at a completion date of the end of December 2010, to be able to incorporate the updated national strategy due in December.

Are you carrying too much weight? Is it affecting how you feel about yourself or is it affecting your health?

For overweight adults, losing 5 – 10% of your weight can have significant health benefits. Doncaster NHS has a new adult weight management service called Healthy Weight Solutions. It offers free advice and support for people with a BMI of 25 or more who are motivated to lose weight.

Would you like to exercise but are restricted by a medical condition?

Doncaster have an Exercise for Health Referral Scheme which is aimed at helping people improve their health and well being by becoming more active. It is specifically for people who do not currently participate in regular physical activity. The scheme aims to provide you with the support and advice to exercise safely and appropriately. It is designed with the individual, to meet your specific needs and preferences. It takes place in local leisure centres, and participants receive a 50% discount on standard session prices. 
